PEDALS, PIPES & PIZZA HAD PIZZAZZ!!!

Saturday, March 16th was a delightful day at All Saints Episcopal Church in North Adams! Dr. Matthew McConnell, Minister of Music at All Saints and member of the Berkshire Chapter of the AGO, led an outstanding and delightful "hands-on" experience for twenty children, ages 6-18, who learned a wealth of information about the "King of Instruments," the pipe organ.

The program began with an organ composition played by Dr. Matt on the church's Möller Organ: *Prelude* from *Te Deum* by Marc-Antoine Charpentier (1643-1704) (arr. Lyndon Hills). This piece featured the various octaves of the trumpet stop on the organ. He beautifully executed the piece and demonstrated the majestic sounds of this reed stop on the organ.

The next piece played by Scott Bailey, member of the Berkshire Chapter of the AGO and member/Board Member of the Springfield Chapter of the AGO expertly demonstrated the melodious sounds of the flute stops of the organ in the composition *The Fifers* by Jean-François Dandrieu (1681-1738).

A "Brief History of the Organ" followed the musical selections. This talk was assigned to Bill Czelusniak, Organ Builder and Tuner from Northampton. However, he was ill, so Dr. Matt was the "pinch-hitter." Being a well-prepared teacher, he, at the last

minute,” pulled a rabbit out of the hat,” so to speak, and began to tell us the history of the organ. (His secret was that he brought some notes with him, just in case.)

The last segment of the first part of the program was “Comparing the Piano and the Organ.” Dr. Matt was at the organ and Charles Marshall, member/Board Member of the Springfield Chapter of the AGO, was at the piano. This spontaneous segment featured the sustaining power of the organ over the piano and the superiority of the piano to sustain arpeggios. It was concluded that each instruments had its own striking qualities. The Organ is a magnificent wind instrument and the Piano is a magnificent percussive/stringed instrument!

The first “hands-on” experience for the students was next: “How the Organ Works” and “A Look Inside the Organ.” Since Mr. Czelusniak was scheduled to be the facilitator of this part of the program, Larry Bishop, member of the Berkshire Chapter of the AGO, came to the rescue! Coincidentally, he had given a similar talk the week before; he was well prepared to “pinch hit!” All the students enjoyed seeing and hearing the organ at work – watching the “shutters” open and close for the *Swell* and *Choir* Divisions of the organ. It was *Great* fun!

Mr. Marshall adeptly played *Praeludium in F-Dur (Prelude in F Major)* by Johann Sebastian Bach (1685-1750) to demonstrate the use of the pedals of the organ. While the “Tour of the Organ” was continuing, Mr. Bailey stepped up to the plate and played “*Praeludium & Fuga in d-moll (Prelude and Fugue in d minor)*” by Bach. The reason he played this piece is that one of the students wanted to hear a piece on the organ that sounded like a “Haunted House.” Mr. Bailey played the piece magnificently (with special sound effects from the organist, himself, during the rests)!

During the break, while Dr. Matt was ordering the PIZZA, the students had an opportunity to play the Möeller Organ, the Kurtzweiller Synthesizer, and the Steinway Upright Piano. Sometimes it sounded like cacophony, but once in awhile we heard the strains of “Heart and Soul,” almost simultaneously.

When the break was over, we returned to the program. Dr. Matt began with a demonstration of “Registration and Special Effects.” The students were amazed at the musical capabilities of the Organ! A Hymn Demonstration in which the tone colors of the

organ were used to enhance the meaning of the words that were sung, with audience participation, followed.

Next, Mr. Marshall played a piece from the Renaissance called "Gaillard" (Anonymous, 1529). Individuals sometimes incorporated this dance during exercises. Among those who used this style of music was Queen Elizabeth I of England when she was in her 50's!

The last part of the program allowed the students to "shine." Each one, who prepared a piece to play, had the opportunity to play it on the organ. Some even played extemporaneously! (Sometime during the last third of the program, the pizza passed by the audience.) We were all ready by the conclusion of the program to enjoy our pizza!

The 20 students and 7 adult participants consumed eleven boxes of plain, pepperoni, meat and mushrooms, and "the works" pizza along with several liters of soda! The program went extremely well. It will yield fruit, eventually: more organists for our churches in the future! We extend "Many Thanks" to Dr. Matt and the Berkshire Chapter of the American Guild of Organists for the investment made in the lives of young musicians at Pedals, Pipes and Pizza!

GREATER WESTFIELD CHORAL ASSOCIATION
SPRING CONCERT 2013 – A GREAT EXTRAVAGANZA!!

I used to think that experiencing fine, quality music in Western Massachusetts was found mostly in the Berkshires. However, I was wrong. Last Spring I attended the Annual Spring Concert of the Greater Westfield Choral Association (better known by the singers as GWCA - pronounced gwahcuh) and was enamored by the director, **Marc Winer**, the singers and the orchestra. Impressed by the excellent concert, I approached Marc after the performance, congratulated him and said that I would like to join the group the following season. (He was glad to know that I was a Tenor.) He told me that the group would commence in the fall, for the first time in many years, and that he would contact me when the time to rehearse was approaching.

Rehearsals commenced on September 23, 2012 in Bates Hall at Westfield State University on Sunday afternoons from 4:00 to 6:00 pm. We began our rehearsals for the Winter Concert, which was held in December. The concert was in conjunction with the Festival Chorus under the direction of **Allan Taylor**, past Dean and **Chiff Chat** Editor, and was **well received** by the audience.

On January 6, 2013, we began the rehearsal cycle for the Spring Concert, which was held on Sunday, March 10, 2013 at First Congregational Church, the church on the Green, in Westfield. Our preparation time was somewhat hindered by the weather, but as the old postal service adage goes, neither rain, nor sleet, nor snow could stop the mail from being delivered; the same principal premise is characteristic of GWCA. We had a concert to prepare for, so we just had longer rehearsals to make up for lost time!

The Spring Concert on Sunday, March 10 was **magnificent**. Marc did a brilliant job conducting the Mozart **Missa Brevis in D** and the **Te Deum** by Rutter, as well as the varied music for the second part of the program: **Shenandoah, Among the Leaves So Green-O, Clare Benediction**, etc. Each one in the *Chorus* and the *Soloists* (who were singers in GWCA!) worked hard all season and produced an excellent program because of their talent and Marc's leadership. The *Orchestra, Organist (AGO Member **Scott Bailey**), and Brass Ensemble* were top-notch as well!

There are two reasons why I have chosen to write this article for the **Chiff Chat**. First of all, if you are a singer and are looking

for a Chorus to join, **this is the one!** We have an enjoyable time together, working hard and reaping the benefits of presenting quality music and pleasing the audience. Marc is a wonderful director. He is very personable, very professional and precise in his conducting techniques. We work hard, yet, at the same time, have fun! I have been in several community-based choral groups; he is one of the best directors under whom I have rehearsed and performed. Secondly, for those who like to participate by being members of the audience, **this is the concert to attend!** The music is varied, presented professionally, and enjoyable to hear.
